“Truth:

The New Agenda for Peace and Security”

As you may know, we were very disappointed and concerned when our July speaker fell ill. So we are delighted to announce that he has fully recovered and will present his talk to us on Monday, August 20, at 7:30 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike! Eugene B. Kogan is the latest speaker in our “Practical Pathways to Peace” series. On this occasion he will present both why and how truth is vital for the survival of our democracy, for the sustainability of our domestic and foreign policies, and for the progress of peace, security and stability in the world. He will leave us with tools that we as citizens can use to bring truth back into the political life of our country.

A Senior Political Analyst with Americans for Informed Democracy (aidemocracy.org), Eugene’s research interests include U.S. foreign policy, Congress, international security, and nuclear proliferation in North East Asia. In May of this year, Eugene was presented the Pi Sigma Alpha Award and delivered the 2007 Pi Sigma Alpha Lecture (on congressional war powers) at Quinnipiac University. (Pi Sigma Alpha is the U.S. National Political Science Honor Society.) From February to May, he was a Maimonides Jewish Leaders Fellow at Yale

The second episode is entitled, "Noughts and Crosses." "With the domination of Christianity from 500 AD, Jonathan Miller wonders how disbelief began to re-emerge in the 15th and 16th centuries. He discovers that division within the Church played a more powerful role than the scientific discoveries of the period. He also visits Paris, the home of the 18th century atheist, Baron D'Holbach, and shows how politically dangerous it was to undermine the religious faith of the masses." — from the BBC website at <http://www.bbc.co.uk/bbcfour/documentaries/features/atheism.shtml>

August Book Discussion & Potluck

Join us on Saturday, August 11, for a picnic and discussion at the lovely home of Bill and Kathy Lyon from 11:00 a.m. until around 4:00 p.m. The Lyons will provide meat for the grill and soft drinks. Feel free to bring a side dish, beverage and/or lawn chair.

From 12:30 p.m. - 1:30 p.m. we will discuss a chapter of the book, *The Varieties of Scientific Experience*, which is a collection of lectures given by Carl Sagan. Our discussion will focus on Chapter 6, "The God Hypothesis," pages 147-168 and the Q&A for this lecture which is on pages 234-244.

Directions to 120 Dudleytown Road in Cornwall, Connecticut, from the New Haven area. Route 8 north to exit 38 (Thomaston). Turn left off the ramp. Turn left onto 254 toward Litchfield. Turn left at the end of 254 onto 118. Turn right onto Route 63 before Litchfield center. Turn left onto Route 4 at the rotary in Goshen. Stay on Route 4 when it turns left. Watch for a sign for Cornwall Village. Turn left onto Pine Street (directly opposite Route 125). At the end of Pine St. turn left onto Valley Road. After 2 miles, continue on Valley Road past the second street on the left (Everest Hill Rd.). The road will fork and you will see Castle Road on the left and an unmarked road on the right, which is Dudleytown Road. Take the right fork onto Dudleytown Road. The road turns to dirt about half-way up the mile-long hill. At the end there's a metal gate, beyond which is a dirt path. The driveway is on the right. #120 is painted on the telephone pole.
