Abraham Lincoln, as Perceived in His Own Time by Robert Ingersoll

Join us on **Monday, April 21, 2008**, at 7:30 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden, when our vice president, Doug Peary, will treat us to an unusual variation on his Humanist Hero series; he will present Abraham Lincoln using the words of the orator Robert Green Ingersoll.

Abraham Lincoln was born on February 12, 1809, and lived and worked as an attorney in Illinois before becoming President. Robert Ingersoll was born in 1833, lived and worked in Illinois as an attorney, became Attorney General for the State of Illinois, and became a nationally renowned skeptical freethinker and prominent speaker.

During his lifetime, Ingersoll told the story of Lincoln using the testimony of those people who knew and loved Lincoln as to his views on religion. Many of Lincoln's friends were skeptics and deists, who told Ingersoll of Lincoln's freethinking and deist views. Lincoln was never a member as an adult of a Christian church and followed the deist religious views of Voltaire,

Book Discussion — Your Inner Fish

The next book we will read is "Your Inner Fish: A Journey into the 3.5-Billion-Year History of the Human Body" by Neil Shubin. This fascinating book is written by one of the world's experts in this field, is packed with lots of information, and is, surprisingly, a very easy read. Although this is a new book, lots of copies are available at public libraries as well as at bookstores and online. We will meet to discuss this book on Saturday, May 10, 2:30 p.m. until 4:30 p.m. at USNH, 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden.

"Why do we look the way we do? What does the human hand have in common with the wing of a fly? Are breasts, sweat glands, and scales connected in some way? To better understand the inner workings of our bodies and to trace the origins of many of today's most common diseases, we have to turn to unexpected sources: worms, flies, and even fish.

"Neil Shubin, a leading paleontologist and professor of anatomy who discovered Tiktaalik—the "missing link" that made headlines around the world in April 2006—tells the story of evolution by tracing the organs of the human body back millions of years, long before the first creatures walked the earth. By examining fossils and DNA, Shubin shows us that our hands actually resemble fish fins, our head is organized like that of a long-extinct jawless fish, and major parts of our genome look and function like those of worms and bacteria.
