David Schafer on “The Missing Years in the Evolution of Humanism”

Our regular monthly meeting, on Monday, August 17, will begin at 7:30 p.m. with half an hour of refreshments and conversation. The main program, at 8:00 p.m., will begin with a few announcements and continue with David’s talk, followed by discussion.

David explains his presentation in the following words: “When we Humanists are asked for a short history of our movement, most of us are likely to begin with the Age of Enlightenment (ca. 1700-1800 CE), or perhaps somewhat earlier, with the European Renaissance (ca. 1300-1600 CE). But after the Enlightenment, it’s quite likely that we’ll skip over a century or more and move directly to the Humanist Manifesto of 1933, when modern Humanism, at least modern American Humanism, took what was arguably its first concrete shape. At this point the inquiring mind will ask, with some justification, ‘But what about the nineteenth century, and the first third of the twentieth? Didn’t anything worth mentioning happen then?’ These are fair questions, and it seems to me that the answers might be worth our consideration.

“I plan to examine some of the essential features of American Humanism, as it was defined in that first Humanist Manifesto, and ask how these features may have been influenced by, or even dependent upon, major events, personalities, and movements of the nineteenth century. To help jog my memory and organize my

talk I’ll use the famous 15 theses of the Manifesto, and group their subjects—conveniently for my purposes, and some might say arbitrarily—into five somewhat overlapping categories: philosophy, religion, the physical world, human nature, and finally human values (where I’ll touch on ethics and morals, politics, economics, and esthetics). Along the way, I’ll have quite a bit to say about such sweeping topics as Romanticism, Imperialism, Transcendentalism, Evolution, the American Civil War, and Victorianism, and such major historical figures as Immanuel Kant, Charles Darwin, Karl Marx, and Ralph Waldo Emerson.”

David hopes there will be something in this talk for everybody. Come and bring a friend!
