Secular Coalition's Executive Director in Connecticut April 2-3

Do you care about religious freedom of conscience? Between April 2 and 3, there are four opportunities to see Sean Faircloth, Executive Director of the Secular Coalition for America. The event hosted by the Humanist Association of Connecticut on Sunday, April 3, will begin at 4:30 p.m. with refreshments followed by the main program at 5:00 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden.

The Secular Coalition for America is the first organization representing secular Americans to engage in a formal briefing with White House officials. About five years old, the Coalition is an organization of organizations, working on their behalf to increase visibility and respect for nontheistic viewpoints in the United States and to protect and strengthen the secular character of the U.S. Government. Advocating that American politics espouse the complete separation of church and state as established by the Constitution, the Coalition holds reason and science as its guiding tenets for public policy.

Sean Faircloth was hired as the Secular Coalition for America's Executive Director in June of 2009. He served a decade in the Maine State Legislature and in his last term was elected Majority Whip by his colleagues. Faircloth was an accomplished legislator, successfully spearheading over thirty pieces of legislation.

David Hume, Humanist Hero

Join us Monday, April 18, at 7:30 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden when the Humanist Association of Connecticut's vice-President, Rev. Douglas Peary, will return with the latest in his "Humanist Heroes" series. This month his subject will be the Scottish Enlightenment thinker, David Hume.

David Hume was born in Edinburgh, Scotland in 1711. His father was an attorney and a gentleman farmer. His mother's father was President of the College of Justice. The family was Calvinist Presbyterian. He was educated at home by his mother to age 12, attended a school of Classical education until he was 18, and then received higher education majoring in Philosophy. He found the Bible replete with fiction and said there are no miracles. He soon began questioning religion, the Bible and belief in God, but held an agnostic position because he believed that atheism stands on the same dubious ground of speculation that religious belief stands on. The founding fathers of the United States of America based some of their views of Democracy on the writings of Hume. Hume died in his mid 60's.

This year's Connecticut Food Bank "Walk Against Hunger" will be on Sunday, May 1, at East Rock Park in New Haven. Registration starts at 1:00 p.m. with the walk at 2:00 p.m.

The Connecticut Food Bank reports nearly fifteen percent of Connecticut residents surveyed for the Gallup-Healthways Well-Being Index said there were times in the past twelve months when they did not have enough money to buy food they needed for themselves or their family. Feeding America's Map the Food Gap reports fifty-two percent of food insecure people in Connecticut are not poor enough to qualify for food stamps.
