The Bermuda Triangle: Anatomy of a Mystery

We're pleased to announce Ken Feder, Ph.D., will give another of his popular talks at our May monthly meeting at 700 Hartford Turnpike, Hamden, on Monday, May 19.

This talk is sponsored by a generous donation from Joyce Wolf in memory of her late husband and former HAC board member, Nat Wolf.

There is a wide swath of the Atlantic Ocean that harbors a terrifying mystery. Hundreds of boats, dozens of aircraft, and perhaps thousands of people have plied its waters or flown through its airspace only to disappear, with no evidence left behind of the tragedy that befell them. I am referring, of course, to the Bermuda Triangle. But is there really any mystery at all? Are the disappearances extraordinary or inexplicable? Ken Feder will examine some of the most famous stories told about the Bermuda Triangle, focusing on the most notorious: Flight 19 and the loss of five Avenger Torpedo bombers and the subsequent disappearance of one of the planes sent out to search for the five. The prosaic explanation for this 1945 tragedy is, as it always has been, visible in plain view. In other words, there's no need to cancel that cruise or visit to the Bahamas. You'll be fine.

Ken is a professor of Archaeology at Central Connecticut State University, author of five books and the co-author of another. He has been the token skeptic on several TV programs.

We'll start with half an hour of coffee and conversation at 7:30 p.m. Ken's talk will follow brief announcements at 8:00 p.m.

USNH Cinema, Friday May 2

This month’s Humanist Cinema will be held Friday, May 2, at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden. We will be back to the traditional potluck dinner format, but will be showing a full-length movie, Lee Daniels’ *The Butler*. This 2013 Hollywood release was inspired by the true story of Eugene Allen, who served in the White House for 34 years under eight presidents, from Truman to Reagan. The movie is set against the historical events of Allen’s childhood on a plantation in the early 1920s, and his interactions with several presidents. Allen and his wife, Helene, are fictionalized as Cecil and Gloria Gaines, and are played by Forest Whitaker and Oprah Winfrey.

The potluck starts at 6:30 p.m. followed by the movie promptly at 7:00 p.m. Discussion follows.

“Thinking, Fast and Slow”

The Book Discussion Group will next read and discuss *Thinking, Fast and Slow* by Daniel Kahneman. We will meet on Saturday, May 31 from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden to discuss the book. In this international bestseller, Kahneman, the renowned psychologist and winner of the Nobel Prize in Economics, takes us on a groundbreaking tour of the mind and explains the two systems that drive the way we think. System 1 is fast, intuitive, and emotional; System 2 is slower, more deliberative, and more logical. The impact of overconfidence on corporate strategies, the difficulties of predicting what will make us happy in the future, the profound effect of cognitive biases on everything from playing the stock market to planning our next vacation — each of these can be understood only by knowing how the two systems shape our judgments and decisions. Engaging the reader in a lively conversation about how we think, Kahneman reveals where we can and cannot trust our intuitions and how we can tap into the benefits of slow thinking. He offers practical and enlightening insights into how choices are made in both our business and our personal lives — and how we can use different techniques to guard against the mental glitches that often get us into trouble. Winner of the National Academy of Sciences Best Book Award and the Los Angeles Times Book Prize and selected by *The New York Times Book Review* as one of the ten best books of 2011, *Thinking, Fast and Slow* is destined to be a classic. The book is available in many public libraries. Refreshments will be served.
