The Continuing Evolution of Darwin's Theory of Evolution

Please join us at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, February 16 when we will mark Darwin Day with a special presentation by our very own Dr. David Schafer.

The advancement of scientific knowledge never ends. One new fact leads to another investigation. Today nearly everyone recognizes that "The Origin of Species" was the culmination of Charles Darwin's successful efforts to make sense of his remarkable observations of relationships among myriad varying life forms. At the same time, "The Origin" was also the beginning of a series of new questions, previously unthinkable and at the time mostly unanswerable, of which many are being answered today, and others are still waiting to be asked. David Schafer will track the progress of evolution's evolution, starting with some well-known events and moving up to some less familiar and perhaps also surprising (and possibly even disturbing!) discoveries of recent times.

Book Discussion: Sex at Dawn

The book for February will be “Sex at Dawn: The Prehistoric Origins of Modern Sexuality” by psychologists Christopher Ryan and Cacilda Jethá. This thought-provoking book weaves together evidence from anthropology, archaeology, primatology, anatomy, and psychosexuality to show almost everything we “know” about sex is suspect.

Per the jacket flap: “In the tradition of the best historical and scientific writing, ‘Sex at Dawn’ unapologetically upends unwarranted assumptions and unfounded conclusions while offering a revolutionary understanding of why we live and love as we do.”

“The essential corrective to the evolutionary psychology literature, ‘Sex at Dawn’ irrefutably shows that the urgent sexuality apparent everywhere in human society and that requires layers of religious, social, and psychological suppression was a constant feature on the African savanna. The more dubious its evidentiary basis and connection with current reality, the more ardently the scientific inevitability of monogamy is maintained - even as it collapses around us. Darwin and science have been corralled into fomenting useless, irrational guilt.” - Dr. Stanton Peele.

This book will perhaps shed some light on the depictions and discussions of sexuality in recent book group selections “The End of Men: And the Rise of Women” and “Ecotopia.”

1966-68, he joined the Rockefeller Foundation in Bangkok, Thailand, where he was acting physiology chair, new medical school, Mahidol University. The Rockefeller Foundation also supported two years of cholera research and six Bengali post-graduate students as teaching assistants. Not one to waste an opportunity, during those five years David also engaged in advanced study in Hinduism and Buddhism. After returning to the U.S., David spent the rest of his scientific career with the US Veterans Administration, concurrently with Yale when he came to Connecticut from Minnesota. He also co-founded the Humanist Association of Connecticut and served as its president, after which he became national president of the Unitarian Universalist Humanists, 2003-2010.

David Niose, Legal Director of the American Humanist Association, past-president of the American Humanist Association and past-president of the Secular Coalition for America, will be discussing his new book, “Fighting Back the Right: Reclaiming America from the Attack on Reason,” at USNH on February 28 at 2:00 p.m.

“Fighting Back the Right” discusses the rapidly changing political scene and demographics in America, as increasing numbers are identifying as non-religious and support for issues such as marriage equality are at an all-time high. David will discuss the emergence of a new alliance of progressive interests who are committed to fighting for rational public policy in America and reversing the damage inflicted by decades of conservative dominance. 7th Annual Darwin Day Dinner

The 7th Annual Darwin Day Dinner will be held at 6:00 p.m. on Saturday February 7. This year the event will be held at the Norwalk Inn & Conference Center, 99 East Avenue in Norwalk. The cost is \$65 per person.

The speaker this year is Prof. Richard O. What is aesthetic evolution? What mechanisms of aesthetic evolution have impacted humans and human sexuality? SMART Recovery on Facebook

Efforts to provide a modern, science-based alternative to 12-step addiction recovery programs have begun to pay off in the last year. Thanks primarily to the efforts of Joseph Esposito, there are now weekly meetings at the Hagerman Memorial Library in East Haven on Saturday afternoons at 12:15 p.m., and a Yale Humanist Community-sponsored meeting at the Grove in New Haven on Monday nights at 6:30 p.m.

Now more than 20 years old, SMART Recovery uses a combination of simple worksheets and self-administered cognitive behavioral therapy to build and maintain motivation to abstain; deal with urges and cravings; manage thoughts and behaviors; and balance short and long-term needs.

You do not need to be a trained counselor or have had addiction problems to facilitate a SMART Recovery meeting. Since 12 Step programs are available in most towns in Connecticut, there's a huge need for more SMART Recovery facilitators so that people suffering from addictive behaviors can choose a program that works for them.
