Cancer, Croatia, and Italy

John Pawelek will return as the featured speaker at our monthly meeting on Monday, September 21, with a talk about his lectures this summer at The Fritz Bender Foundation Cancer Research Meetings in Croatia and Italy. The meeting will be held at USNH, 700 Hartford Turnpike, Hamden, at 7:30 p.m.

John is a long-time member of USNH and a research faculty member in the Yale School of Medicine, specializing in the cancer melanoma. He will describe his most recent findings on how melanoma cells metastasize. He will also give a brief chronicle of the beautiful spots in Croatia and Italy he and his wife Linda visited during the trip.

This film chronicles the period in 1965 when Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. led a campaign to secure equal voting rights in the face of violent opposition. The march from Selma to Montgomery culminated in President Johnson signing the Voting Rights Act of 1965, one of the most significant victories for the civil rights movement.

Book Discussion: Goliath: "Life and Loathing in Greater Israel" by Max Blumenthal

Our book for September is "Goliath: Life and Loathing in Greater Israel" by award-winning journalist Max Blumenthal (author also of "Republican Gomorrah: Inside the Movement that Shattered the Party on the Tea Party").

From the front flap:

"In Goliath, New York Times bestselling author Max Blumenthal takes us on a journey through the badlands and high roads of Israel-Palestine, painting a startling portrait of Israeli society under the siege of increasingly authoritarian politics as the occupation of the Palestinians deepens..."

"As Blumenthal reveals, Israel has become a country where right-wing leaders like Avigdor Lieberman and Bibi Netanyahu are sacrificing democracy on the altar of their power politics; where the loyal opposition largely and passively stands aside and watches the organized assault on civil liberties; where state-funded Orthodox rabbis publish books that provide instructions on how and when to kill Gentiles; where half of Jewish youth declare their refusal to sit in a classroom with an Arab; and where mob violence targets Palestinians and African asylum seekers scapegoated by leading government officials as 'demographic threats.'"

Given the nature of the material, the book has engendered controversy. If you Google "atlantic afraid free speech," you will find a link to a December, 2013, *Atlantic* article: "Afraid of Free Speech, on Many Fronts: PEN, Google, China, *Goliath*" by James Fallows. This article discusses the debate, the purpose of the book, and includes links to other notable reviews of the book, including "The 'I Hate Israel' Handbook" by Eric Alterman in *The Nation*.

The book is readily available in numerous libraries around the state.
