Nina Stein In Israel/Palestine

Our featured speaker at our monthly meeting on Monday, November 16 will be HAC member Nina Stein, Ph.D. The meeting will be held at USNH, 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden at 7:30 p.m.

"I traveled to Israel/Palestine this summer as part of the 54th delegation of Interfaith Peace Builders. This organization brings people to the area in order to observe first-hand the situation on the ground.

"During the trip we were presented with different viewpoints, and met with individuals and representatives of various organizations involved in different aspects of the struggle for a just peace. We traveled both within the 1948 borders of Israel and in the West Bank.

"Through a slide presentation, I will recount some of what we saw and heard.

"I grew up in a family where there was a lot of emphasis on human rights and social justice. It is this background along with my Jewish heritage that led to my interest in the Israel/Palestine conflict, which I view primarily from a human rights perspective. This interest led me to join and

the Waterbury Campus of the University of Connecticut. She has also taught at Hartford State Technical College and at Yale.

Celebrating Carl Sagan: A Conversation with Nick Sagan

7:00 p.m. at Yale University, Linsly-Chittenden Hall, Room 102

Though he died in 1996, astronomer Carl Sagan's work continues to have a tremendous impact. He influenced a generation of scientists and thinkers, taught millions about the wonders of science, and inspired the world to ask big questions. His work enriched and entertained, from his books like "Contact," "Pale Blue Dot," and "The Demon-Haunted World" to his television series *Cosmos* (recently rebooted with new host Neil deGrasse Tyson). He inspired us to look up to the stars, but also to look inward. He helped us better understand the world around us—and by encouraging us to be curious, courageous, and compassionate, he also helped us better understand ourselves and one another. Carl Sagan was an unparalleled scientist, storyteller, and communicator, and his contributions will be felt for years to come.

This Carl Sagan Day, Yale Humanist Community (YHC) is honored and thrilled to welcome a special guest: Nick Sagan, son of Carl Sagan. In a moderated discussion with YHC Executive Director Chris Stedman, Nick will talk about his father's impact, the connection between his father's work and Humanism, and his memories of growing up with Carl Sagan—including what it was like to record a greeting for potential extraterrestrials at six years old for the Voyager Golden Record.

Nick Sagan is an author of novels, screenplays, teleplays, comic books, animation episodes and computer games. A prolific filmmaker and writer, his credits include episodes of *Star Trek* and the book "You Call This the Future?," which Publisher's Weekly called a "delightful 'expedition in search of the future,' providing clear explanations of today's cutting edge technologies." He is also the author of the acclaimed "Idlewild" series and creator of the "Shrapnel" graphic novel series for Radical Publishing. The son of astronomer Carl Sagan and Pioneer plaque artist Linda Salzman, Nick was 6 years old when his greeting, "Hello from the children of planet Earth," was placed aboard the Voyager Golden Record as a representation of the English language for potential extraterrestrials to one day discover.

Join the Yale Humanist Community on November 9 for a conversation with Nick Sagan, and a celebration of the life and legacy of Carl Sagan.

Volunteers Needed – New Haven and Bridgeport

LifeBridge Community Services is a 166 year-old social services agency whose mission is to empower people to build a brighter future, by linking flexible, innovative programs to restore personal capability, develop skills, and build a pathway to self-sufficiency. LifeBridge is located in Bridgeport with a Food Services Program in New Haven.

Senior Dine Program – New Haven location

The Food Services Program offers an alternative to dining at senior community centers and housing communities by offering

meals at local area restaurants on specific days during the week with a fixed menu of 9-10 entrées. Seniors benefit from a varied menu in a social setting that lifts their spirits and nurtures their bodies. Volunteers are needed to register and greet the clients for this program, collect tickets and track attendance.

VITA Program – Bridgeport location

LifeBridge Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program provides free income tax return preparation to eligible low income clients from late January until early

April. Last year, LifeBridge helped over 650 families complete their taxes free of charge. As one of the larger VITA sites in Fairfield County, we utilize volunteers as Greeters, Preparers and for Quality Review. Volunteers receive online and in person training before tax season begins. Prior accounting or tax experience is not required.

Book Discussion: "The Collapse of American Criminal Justice" by William J. Stuntz

Our book for November is "The Collapse of American Criminal Justice" by the late Harvard legal scholar William J. Stuntz. (<http://today.law.harvard.edu/william-stuntz-1958-2011-an-examined-life-of-thoughtfulness-and-grace>).

From the book's inside flap: "The rule of law has vanished in America's criminal justice system. Prosecutors now decide whom to punish and how severely. Almost no one accused of a crime will ever face a jury. Inconsistent policing, rampant plea bargaining, over-crowded courtrooms, and ever more draconian sentencing have produced a gigantic prison population, with black citizens the primary defendants and victims of crime. In this passionately argued book, the leading criminal law scholar of his generation looks to history for the roots of these problems - and for their solutions."

From Louis H. Pollak, Senior U.S. District Court Judge: "[This book] ...is a searching - and profoundly disturbing - examination of American criminal law in action. It shows that our main achievement has been the incarceration of millions, while giving short shrift to fairness and equality. This is a masterful work."

From David Alan Sklansky, Boalt Hall School of Law: "Stuntz argues that much of what we think about American criminal justice is wrong. The system is neither too lenient nor too punitive, but too prone to both extremes, and the extremism is caused by too little democracy. Sweeping, learned, and bracingly original, Stuntz's crowning achievement is a wonderful book."

The book is readily available in numerous libraries around the state.
