Directions

From South of New Haven:

Take the Trumbull Street Exit off I-91, which is the first exit past the 95/91 interchange. At the end of the ramp, take a right onto Orange Street. Go north on Orange Street 10 blocks to Avon Street. All the side streets are one way, so you need to go around the block to get to 51 Linden Street: take a right onto Avon, then a left onto Foster, then a left onto Linden Street.

From North of New Haven:

Take the Willow Street Exit off I-91, which is Exit 5. At the end of the exit ramp, take a right onto Willow Street. Go west on Willow Street to the third traffic

Book Discussion: "The Octopus"

Our book for June is *The Octopus: A Story of California* by Frank Norris. The discussion will take place Saturday, June 18, 2016 at 2:00 p.m. in the library of the Unitarian Society of New Haven at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden.

Like the tentacles of an octopus, the tracks of the railroad reached out across California, as if to grasp everything of value in the state. Based on an actual, bloody dispute between wheat farmers and the Southern Pacific Railroad in 1880, *The Octopus* is a stunning novel of the waning days of the frontier West. To the tough-minded and self-reliant farmers, the monopolistic, land-grabbing railroad represented everything they despised: consolidation, organization, conformity. But Norris idealizes no one in this epic depiction of the volatile situation, for the farmers themselves ruthlessly exploited the land, and in their hunger for larger holdings they resorted to the same tactics used by the railroad: subversion, coercion and outright violence. In his introduction, Kevin Starr discusses Norris's debt to Zola for the novel's extraordinary sweep, scale and abundance of characters and details.

On Saturday, July 16, we will discuss *The Social Conquest of Earth* by E.O. Wilson.

"Biologist E. O. Wilson's brilliant new volume, *The Social Conquest of Earth*, could more aptly be entitled 'Biology's Conquest of Science.' Drawing on his deep understanding of entomology and his extraordinarily broad knowledge of the natural and social sciences, Wilson makes a strong case for the synthesis of knowledge across disciplines. Understanding the biological origin of what makes us human can help us to build better theories of social and psychological interaction; in turn, understanding how other social species have evolved may help us to better understand the origin of our own. But the main reason that Wilson's book is successful is that he also brings into biology the best of what social science has to offer."
