The Pro-Truth Pledge

Are you concerned by the rising tide of fake news and alternative facts in our public discourse? What if you had the power to do something about it? Join us on Monday, March 19, because our speaker, Dr. Gleb Tsipursky, knows exactly how you can help orient the world toward truthfulness.

Dr. Gleb Tsipursky is passionate about promoting truth-oriented behavior, rational thinking, and wise decision-making in public discourse. He researches these topics as a professor at Ohio State University, and serves as the President of Intentional Insights, a nonprofit devoted to popularizing these topics. Its main current focus is the Pro-Truth Pledge, <https://www.protruthpledge.org>, a project that aims to reverse the tide of lies and promote truth in public discourse through combining behavioral science and crowd-sourcing. He has authored a number of books, most notably "The Truth Seeker's Handbook: A Science-Based Guide" and "Find Your Purpose Using Science," and has a new book forthcoming in 2018, "The Alternative to Alternative Facts: Fighting Post-Truth Politics with Behavioral Science." Pieces by him regularly come out in prominent venues such as *Time*, *Scientific American*, *Psychology Today*, *Salon*, *Truthout*, *The Huffington*
