"A Goliath In New York"

This month's main program will feature Ken Feder, Ph.D., professor of anthropology at Central Connecticut State University, and an occasional and eloquent speaker for the New England Skeptical Society.

Entitled "A Goliath In New York: The Sad Tale of the Cardiff Giant," Monday's talk will be about archaeological frauds, focusing on the Cardiff Giant, a nineteenth-century hoax presented as the remains of a giant petrified man. Scientists (the Peabody Museum's own O. C. Marsh included) instantly declared it to be a humbug, but that made little difference to the majority of believers. This is a good story with plenty of implications about the role of science in society.

The meeting will be held November 15th at USNH, 700 Hartford Turnpike, Hamden. Coffee and conversation at 7:30 p.m. will be followed by the main program at 8:00 p.m. Come and bring a friend!

The Humanist Conversations will meet in November at a new day and time: Sunday, Nov. 28, at 3:00 p.m. No Friday evenings were available this month that would work. We are a busy bunch of people!

The topic this month is Humanism and Democracy. The eighth point of The Humanist Manifesto II is "We are committed to an open and democratic society." Later this same document states "We believe in the right to universal education." Our discussion this month will combine these two ideas, based on two readings. The first is a short section of Corliss Lamont's *The Philosophy of Humanism*: chapter VI, section 3, "Humanism and Democracy." The most current edition of this book is the 8th, published in 1997, but earlier editions will suffice for this reading. The second reading is an article by David Schafer in a special issue of the journal *Humanism Today*, entitled *Humanists and Education* (vol. 11, 1997).
