Directions from South of New Haven: Take the Trumbull Street exit off I-91, which is the first exit past the 95/91 interchange. At the end of the ramp, take a right onto Orange Street and go north 10 blocks to Avon Street. All the side streets are one way, so you need to go around the block to get to 51 Linden Street. Take a right onto Avon, then a left onto Foster, then a left onto Linden.

Directions from North of New Haven: From I-91 take Willow Street Exit 5. At the end of the ramp, turn right and go west on Willow Street to the third traffic light at the corner of Willow and Foster; there is a pizza parlor on the near righthand corner. Turn left onto Foster and take the first right onto Linden Street.

Once you are on Linden, #51 is the last house on the right of the first block. The house is a small butterscotch-colored Victorian. There is a 2-car garage between the house and the market on the corner. Park on the streets nearby.

Explorations: Forgotten Ellis Island -

June 1, 2:30 p.m.

The first public health hospital in the United States was opened in 1902 on Ellis Island and functioned until 1930. As part of the immigration complex in New York Harbor, the challenges of dealing with contagious diseases were massive in the days before antibiotics and modern medicines. In light of the present anti-vaccine crisis, this documentary provides an insight into our current challenges.

The Trust Act

Here is a new, urgent request from Connecticut Immigrant Rights Alliance (CIRA) to help fix to the TRUST Act. Supporting this act is one of the best things we can do for immigrant families. The TRUST Act limits cooperation between local police and Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and has passed in the CT State Senate <u>https://ctmirror.org/2019/05/15/ct-senate-passes-bill-restricting-cooperation-with-ice</u>. Connecticut has taken the first step to push back against the current politics of hate and fear, and now we need to keep momentum.

WAYS TO HELP

Make a call today to House Leadership. Call 860-240-8500 and ask to be transferred to House Speaker Joe Aresimowicz or House Majority Leader Matt Ritter's office. Read/say:

"Hello, My name is ______. I am calling today in support of Senate Bill 992, or the TRUST Act. Senate Bill 992 would update the current TRUST Act to deny all detainer requests from ICE, unless ICE can present a judicial warrant to compel Connecticut cooperation. This fix would hold ICE to the same standard as any other police agency, protect individual rights, and keep our families and communities together. I urge Representative (Aresimowicz/Ritter) to let Senate Bill 992 come for a vote on the House floor."

Connectícut Coalítíon of Reason

The Connecticut Coalition of Reason (CT CoR, <u>ctcor.org</u>), the umbrella group of secular organizations in Connecticut, held its May board meeting as a conference call on Sunday, May 19 at 7 p.m.

- The Secular Coalition for Connecticut (SCCT) organized a protest of Franklin Graham's appearance in Bridgeport on Tuesday, May 28. It got some media attention: <u>https://www.ctpost.com/local/ctpost/article/Bridgeport-prepares-for-protests-at-Franklin-13901997.php</u>.
- The legislative session is about over. The uniform oaths bill did not make it out of committee.
- The Patient's Right to Know Bill was not put forward in order to avoid distraction from The National Abortion and Reproductive Rights Action League (NARAL) bill to outlaw deceptive advertising by fake women's health clinics (<u>https://www.prochoiceamerica.org/state-law/connecticut/#fake-health-centers</u>).
- The Governor's office did not issue a Darwin Day proclamation this year. It did issue a National Day of Prayer proclamation.
- Humanists and Freethinkers of Fairfield County (HFFC) is holding a screening of the 2019 documentary about the Satanic Temple, <u>Hail, Satan?</u>, at the Bijou Theater in Bridgeport on Thursday, June 13 at 7 p.m. Doors open at 6:30.
- Atheist Humanist Society of Connecticut and Rhode Island (AHSCTRI) will host The Satanic Temple's Lucius Greeves at the Groton Library on Thursday, August 1 from 7-9 p.m.
- Several groups are holding solstice picnics on Saturday, June 22nd.
