Explorations: Bombing Auschwitz

The liberation of the most notorious of the Nazi death camps happened seventy-five years ago on January 27th, 1945. The PBS documentary we will see addresses an uncomfortable moral question—Should Allied forces have destroyed the camps early on, dooming the inmates to certain death in order to save the hundreds of thousands who followed. This issue raises no easy answers, and engenders much deep thought worthy of consideration today.

A growing worldwide movement has begun that seeks to find solutions to these and other pressing issues. Australian humanitarian Hugh Evans started a movement that mobilizes "global citizens," people who self-identify first and foremost not as members of a state, nation, or tribe but as members of the human race. In this uplifting and personal TED talk, he describes how this new understanding of our place in the world is galvanizing people to take action.
