"Before You Know It: What Science has Revealed about Unconscious Influences on Everyday Life"

- Monday March 16, 7 PM / USNH

John Bargh is James Rowland Angell Professor of Psychology and Professor of Management at Yale University. Before coming to Yale he was on the faculty of New York University for over 20 years. Bargh was one of the early founders of the field of "social cognition" which takes a scientific approach to important life topics such as emotions, the meaning of life, and free will. His talk will focus on the last 40 years of research on the basic question of how much we control the workings of our mind in everyday life.

The HAC book group read Bargh's book of this title in August of 2019.

David Schafer is a retired medical physiologist,
a Humanist, and a brilliant composer. David
has long been the unofficial composer-in-
residence at USNH. David and June Schafer
were founders of the Humanist Association of
Connecticut in 1989.

In May of 1993, the choir of USNH presented
a concert of David Schafer's Music. We now
have a CD recording of that concert, which
will be played for your listening pleasure with
the excellent acoustics of the USNH Sanctuary.
The CD "Concert" will be held in the
Sanctuary. A reception will follow in the
Social Hall.

Copies of the CD will be available to order for
purchase for \$10. Proceeds beyond costs will
be used toward obtaining loan materials for
the USNH Library, including Humanist
reference publications and copies of David's
music.

Explorations: Rodin's The Gates of Hell

-- March 7, 2:30 p.m.

Commissioned in 1880 for a Paris museum, which was never built, Rodin worked on this massive Architectural Sculpture until his death in 1917. This work, composed of 180 figures and a massive gate nearly twenty feet in height, was never cast in bronze in Rodin's lifetime. A casting was finally produced in 1980 with funding from the philanthropist B. Gerald Cantor. This is the story of how this monumental task was realized.
